



## GOP TAX REFORM BILL CREATES JOBS AND CUTS TAXES FOR WYOMING RESIDENTS

Tax reform legislation currently being considered by Congress will have a positive impact on the Wyoming economy.<sup>1</sup> If the current legislation is approved, Wyoming can expect its economy to grow by an additional 11.0% over the next 10 years.<sup>2</sup> That's good news for Wyoming businesses, workers and taxpayers.

### TAX REFORM BENEFITS BOTH BUSINESSES AND WORKERS


The changes to the corporate tax will benefit Wyoming businesses by providing an influx of capital that can be used to create jobs, increase wages, or invest in the overall economy. In addition, a significant amount of this savings will be passed through to workers through higher wages or benefits.

It is estimated that 9,348 jobs will be created along with an increase in wages by \$281,830,100. In particular, the Business and Personal Services, Travel and Entertainment, and Retailing industries will benefit from the Conference proposal and overall, wages will rise by more than 1.4 percent.

### WYOMING RESIDENTS WILL SEE TAX CUTS



Wyoming taxpayers, especially those in the middle to lower classes, will see their taxes reduced by as much as 5.8 percent in the year following the enactment of the Conference proposal. These cuts occur across the board, with people in all income groups seeing a reduction.<sup>3</sup>
